





"Structures of Culture. Structures of Hope" PROJECT REPORT

Project Background

When Typhoon Yolanda (Haiyan) hit in November 2013, it made its last landfall in the Calamian Islands, Northern Palawan causing immense devastation in the area. **Cartwheel Foundation, Inc.'s (CFI)** partner indigenous *Tagbanua* communities, who live along the coastlines of Culion, were among those that had been gravely affected. Homes, classrooms, and boats used for livelihood were severely damaged by the strong winds and heavy downpour of the storm.

In the aftermath of the disaster, CFI responded through *Project RISE* ("Re-Igniting Community Strength through Education")—an initiative that aims to establish and institutionalize collaborative and sustainable rebuilding program for the benefit of 110 *Tagbanua* families through the following: (a) Innovative psychosocial support approaches for healing and recovery, (b) Building of disaster resilient structures, and (c) Facilitation of sustainable livelihood development opportunities.

It in this context that "Structures of Culture, Structures of Hope"—the 2014 collaboration between CFI and Cultures in Harmony (CiH) was born. CiH is a US-based cultural diplomacy organization that forges connections across cultural and national barriers through the medium of music and has been a partner of CFI since 2006. In nurturing Filipino indigenous heritage, both organizations highlight music and art as tools for expression and communication. For this collaboration, CFI and CiH came together specifically contribute to the efforts of and for the Tagbanua post-Typhoon Yolanda (Haiyan), encouraging them to find strength in the richness of their own traditional music and cultural life ways, and renew community confidence.

Key Activities

August 13-14, 2014: Cultural Exchange

On the week of August 13-17, 2014, four CiH musicians visited the *Tagbanua* communities to hold cultural and musical exchange workshops and performances.

For five days, Julliard-trained classical musicians Rebecca Schlappich, Kimberly Patterson, Frank Shaw and Danielle Kuhlmann joined a select group of *Tagbanua* instrumentalists from some of the island communities of Culion and neighboring Coron.

Local participants were Jermie Abella and

Kennedy Lido from Sitio Chindonan; Francisco Abella, Jerico Abella, and Rodolfo Abella from Sitio Alulad; Jomar Apolinario from Barangay Cabugao; Diosdado Abella and Toledo Abella from Barangay Banuang Daan.

The opportunity for learning about each other's music was deep and meaningful as there was much time for interaction. Introductions began with each of the groups performing a traditional piece from their own communities—the Tagbanua sang *tablay*, and demonstrated their *suring*, one of their more famous dances with a man and a woman as partners. CiH musicians in turn



played Ashokan Farewell, an example of an instrumental American folk song, and Fugue from K.404A: Adagio-Vivace by Mozart, to show classical European music that had been composed centuries before.

Nurturing a free and open learning environment, each of the participants took turns in sharing about details on their respective instruments. These included the process of crafting it, the different materials used, the manner by which it is played, and even the possible inspiration for its creation. They enjoyed trying to make sounds with the instruments that were not theirs – the Tagbanua playing on the Western violin, viola, cello, and French horn while the CiH musicians attempting to create music with the indigenous *tambol* (drums), *flauta* (flute), and *yuke* (ukulele). As they shared cultures through stories and song, the Tagbanua have recommitted to keeping alive the spirit uniquely their own as an indigenous people.

The workshops soon turned into a fellowship transcending language and cultural barriers, with CiH and *Tagbanua* musicians performing alongside each other in a series of interactive musical concerts. They toured around the indigenous communities of Cagait, Chindonan, Alulad in Culion, and Kayangan in Coron; they also serenaded the cured lepers of Yangco Hall at the Culion Sanitarium and General Hospital and performed for the townspeople at Culion Elementary School. All the audiences were actively engaged in their program where Western and Tagbanua songs were played and knowledge about their music was shared.

August 21, 2014: Concert at the Ayala Museum

The collaboration culminated in a concert entitled "Cultures in Harmony: Building Structures of Hope with Filipino Indigenous Communities" on August 21, 2014 at the Ayala Museum in Makati City, where the four participating CiH musicians performed with the talented members of the Manila Symphony Orchestra (MSO) and MSO Junior. Western classical pieces were played as well as Filipino folk songs. One of the highlights of the concert was the grand finale, where CiH, MSO and MSO Junior jointly performed the Tagbanua Paalam (Farewell) Song, arranged for string orchestra by CiH's Danielle Kuhlmann.




